## Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Training

The week of November 15-19, 2010 marked the fourth graduating class of Bucks County's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training bringing the total to one-hundred-two (102) certified CIT Officers within Bucks County. CIT is a law enforcement-based crisis-response and diversion strategy in which law enforcement officers receive 40 hrs of mental health training so they can respond to calls involving individuals with possible mental health issues. This ongoing CIT training program was developed from a collaborative effort of the Bucks County, PA Chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), Bucks County Law Enforcement, and Bucks County Mental Health Professionals.

Twenty four (24) individuals were awarded CIT accreditation, along with an official CIT pin that each officer wore on their uniforms to designate this certification, at graduation ceremonies on November 19, 2010 at Bucks County Community College, Newtown Campus. County departments represented were: Bensalem Twp. Police, Bristol Township Police, Doylestown Borough Police, Falls Township Police, Lower Makefield Twp. Police, Lower Southampton Police, New Britain Twp. Police, Newtown Borough Police, Northampton Twp., Penn Foundation Forensic Assertive Community Treatment, Pennridge

Regional Police, Plumstead Township Police, Bucks County Adult Probation & Parole and Paramedics at Medic 122 in Warminster.

Also in attendance were: Bucks County Commissioner, Diane M. Ellis-Marseglia; Chief of Community Outreach with the District Attorney Office, and keynote speaker, David W. Zellis; Director of Bucks County Behavioral Health, Bernard McBride; and Executive Director at Lenape Valley Foundation, Alan Hartl who came to support the graduates and spoke at the ceremonies. Following the keynote speaker was a testimonial from a fellow officer, graduating from the class, Corporal Thomas Augustin from the Lower Makefield Police Department. Corporal Augustin has over twenty years of police experience and talked about what CIT training meant to him. He spoke directly to the audience when he wished there had been this type of training available when he first began his law enforcement career. The training would have been helpful in handling interactions with people with mental illness that he encountered over the years. We thank Corporal Augustin for his willingness to share his CIT training experience and proudly add him to Bucks County's Crisis Intervention Team Family. Throughout the week of CIT training, officers take part in a variety of

education components ranging from how an officer can recognize psychiatric distress and other conditions, how to de-escalate a crisis, how to link people with appropriate treatment, forming positive relationships between law enforcement and the community thus fostering recovery and reducing recidivism. Part of the curriculum involves hearing stories from NAMI families and consumers who have had police interaction. The officers also are taken on site visits. This class had the opportunity to visit a homeless camp and speak with individuals on a one-on-one basis. The Officers were so empowered by this visit, the next morning in class, every officer donated funds and purchased boots and jackets and delivered them to the camp.

NAMI Board members and volunteers gathered in December at the home of NAMI President Kathleen Campbell, celebrating the many NAMI successes. Many of the CIT Task Force members were also in attendance. Members attending the celebration donated cases of soup, bottled water, propane heaters, scarves, gloves, and jackets for those in the homeless camp. CIT Officer Kingdsdorf and Detective Pinkerston from Northampton Township Police delivered the truckload of items to the homeless camp. One more example that CIT - is more than just training.

## Crisis Intervention Team Presentation to 18th Annual Forensic Rights & Treatment Conference

Five members from the Bucks County **Crisis Intervention Team (CIT)**, including NAMI's Carol Ann Meholic, were invited to present at the 18th Annual Forensic Rights and Treatment Conference on November 30, 2010 in Harrisburg, PA. The Bucks County **CIT** program was chosen to present at the conference based on its unique approach to Crisis Intervention Team trainings.

In addition to our formal certified 40-hour program, the **CIT** Task Force

considered other individuals that could benefit from mental health training but may not qualify for the 40-hour course criteria. To enhance officer and community safety, two trainings were developed in collaboration with Bucks County **CIT** and FTAC (Family Training and Advocacy Center). The two courses are a 3.5 hour "Introduction to CIT for Law Enforcement, Management and Emergency Dispatch" and a 6.0 hour "**CIT** Introductory Training for Patrol Officers". To date, 370 individuals

have participated in these trainings and additional trainings are being planned for February and March of 2011.

Among the various groups that took the 6-hour training included several members of Bucks County Community College Security Personnel. The college has approximately 11,000 students on their three campuses and has partnered with **CIT** by allowing our four trainings at their Lower Bucks Bristol Campus and Newtown Campus.

### NAMI Basics Education Program Coming to NAMI Bucks in February

*The fundamentals of caring for you, your family and your child with mental illness*

NAMI Basics is the new signature education program for parents and other caregivers of children and adolescents living with mental illnesses. Development of this program was based on the success of other NAMI signature education programs for consumers and families available across the country. NAMI drew on course elements which have been extensively tested and found to be highly effective in the field. These elements include:

- recognition of mental illness as a continuing traumatic event for the child and the family;
- sensitivity to the subjective emotional issues faced by family caregivers and well children in the family;
- recognition of the need to help ameliorate the day-to-day objective burdens of care and management;
- gaining confidence and stamina for what can be a life-long

role of family understanding and support; and

- empowerment of family caregivers as effective advocates for their children.

The process of emotional learning and practical insight for families occurs most readily, and dependably, on the guided group process which takes place when individual family members are in a class together. This program will also take advantage of advancing technology which allows programs to virtually connect families and provides broader access to vitally important information.

The NAMI Basics Education Program includes the following components:

Six 2.5 hour classes of instructional material, discussions and interactive exercises which may be delivered as a series of consecutive weekly classes, or on consecutive Saturdays to accommodate the time constraints faced by families of children and adolescents.

A section of the NAMI website will be dedicated to disseminating information, including informational videos that can be viewed online, and resources for this program and to connecting family program participants.

In addition to the core course of six classes, additional topic modules will be developed for independent presentations for families interested in specific topics, such as transition issues, and advocacy.

The program includes a rigorous evaluation process to both build an evidence base on the effectiveness of the program and also to help ensure that the program continually delivers best practices to meet the unique needs of families.

Classes begin February 9, 2011 at 10:00 A.M. at the NAMI office, 600 Louis Dr., Suite 106, Warminster, PA. Evening classes will follow.
